## **Vitae**

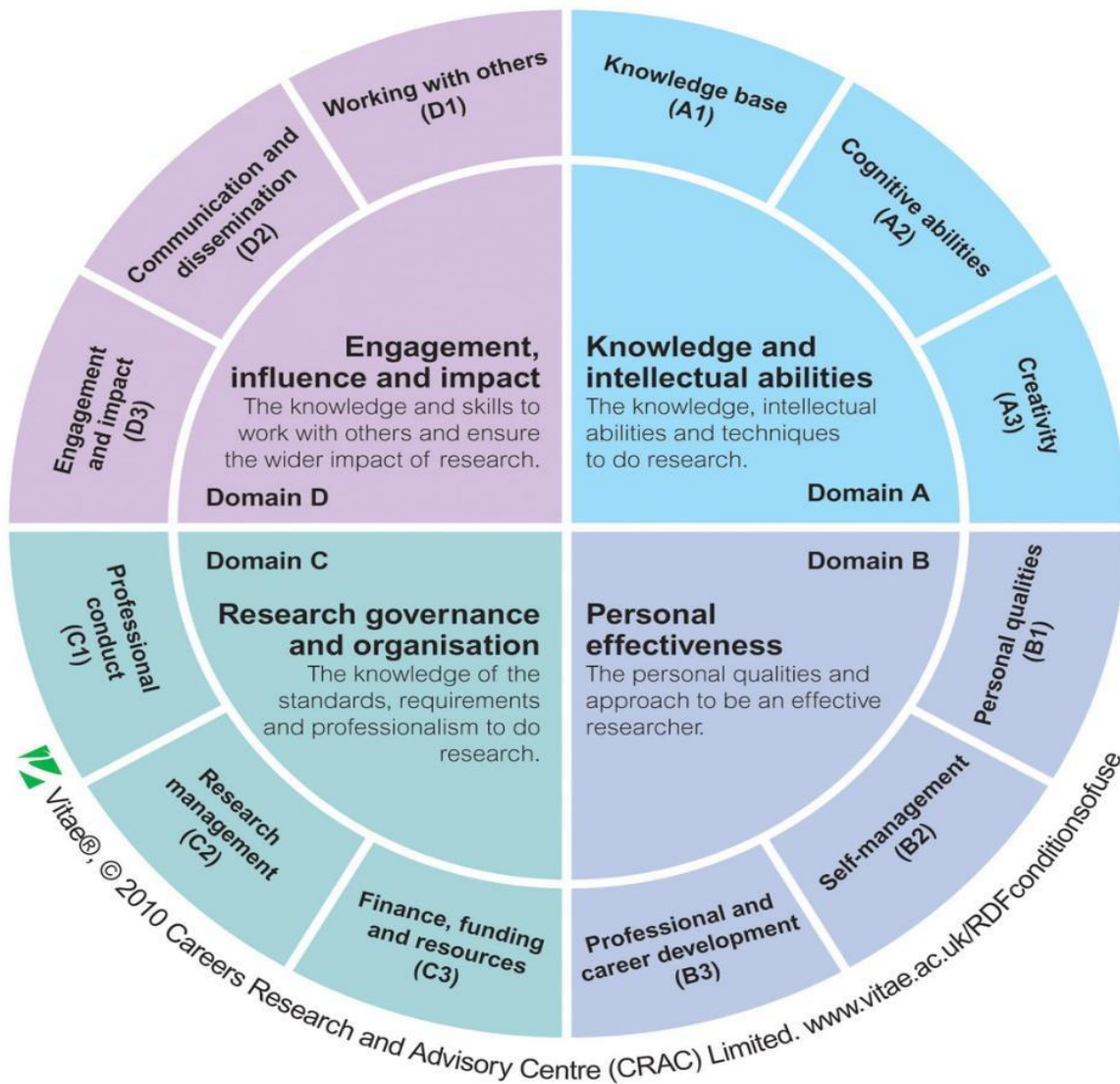

## **Researcher Development Framework (RDF)**

In partnership with RCUK, Vitae has published a Researcher Development Framework (RDF) which is a tool for planning, promoting and supporting the personal, professional and career development of researchers in higher education. It describes the knowledge, skills, behaviors and personal qualities of researchers and encourages them to aspire to excellence through achieving higher levels of development. It details the competencies they might aspire to at different stages of their careers. The RDF was created from empirical data, collected through interviewing researchers, to identify the characteristics of excellent researchers expressed in the RDF as 'descriptors'. The descriptors are structured in four domains and twelve sub-domains, encompassing the knowledge, intellectual abilities, techniques and professional standards to do research, as well as the personal qualities, knowledge and skills to work with others and ensure the wider impact of research. Each of the sixty-three descriptors contains between three to five phases, representing distinct stages of development or level of performance within that descriptor.



Each of our workshops is mapped back to one or more domains within the RDF, which include:

- A** Knowledge and Intellectual Abilities
- B** Personal Effectiveness
- C** Research governance and organization
- D** Engagement, influence and impact

### **Productive Writing: techniques, planning & finishing**

How do you initiate the writing process when faced with only a blank page or a cursor incessantly blinking on the screen? Effective written communication is an essential part of academia and researchers are required to write a variety of documents including proposals, theses, papers for publication, grant proposals and books. Manuscripts must be clear and concise and written in a manner that is appropriate for that particular style of document. Scholarly writing projects involve planning, drafting & redrafting, setting deadlines and collaboration.

This workshop will focus on how to start writing, how to keep going and how to finish. We will cover different styles of documents, language and the academic writing style, in addition to how to plan your writing and a short introduction to new collaborative writing tools.

The workshop will include writing exercises, advice on making writing part of your working routine and a short section on dealing with and providing feedback.

At the end of this workshop researchers will have:

- been introduced to a range of writing productivity techniques;
- planned out a manuscript from scratch;
- discussed various writing challenges with their peers;
- initiated a workplan & set deadlines for their writing project.

## **Publish or Perish: Academic publishing in a nutshell**

Publishing your work and sharing your findings is a key component of a successful research career. A significant time investment is required to successfully publish a paper and several skills are used during the process including collaborative writing, figure design, analysis and concise written communication. With 30,000 journals to choose from and various publishing models to consider, researchers need to be aware of which option will work best for them.

Academic publishing is currently evolving and there have been several new developments in recent years, including requirements for open access and new regulations. Participants will be introduced to the editorial process, various publishing models, open access publishing, legal considerations and how to navigate the academic publishing process.

This workshop is designed to cover the key actions and issues behind publishing a research paper including manuscript preparation, choosing the appropriate journal and peer review. In addition, it will include an introduction to the controversial subject of metrics.

The instructor's own publishing experience will be used to illustrate key points.

At the end of this workshop researchers will have:

- a clear overview of the publishing process & the time frame involved;
- an understanding of open access and copyright and how this applies to scholarly communications;
- an understanding of what is required of authors.

## Introduction to Statistical Analysis Using R

This is a one day intensive course on R. This course will be a mixture of lectures and computer practicals. The main focus will be to introduce fundamental R concepts. No prior programming knowledge of any kind is assumed. This course is suitable for a wide range of applicants.

Course outline:

- Introduction to R: A brief overview of the background and features of the R statistical programming system.
- Entering Data: A description of how to import and export data from R.
- Data types: A summary of R's data types.
- R environment: A description of the R environment including the R working directory, creating/using scripts, saving data and results.
- R Graphics: Creating, editing and storing graphics in R.
- Manipulating data in R: Describing how data can be manipulated in R using logical operators.

Participants are encouraged to contact course presenter prior to the course for more information including use of own laptops so that software could be installed prior to the course.

## Advanced Statistical Analysis Using R

This is a one day intensive course aimed at researchers who wish to further their capability of using the statistical software environment R for advanced statistical analysis. This course assumes prior experience in using R (e.g. 'Introduction Statistical Analysis using R').

This course will concentrate on both the methodology and the use of R to carry out associated data analysis. Here are some of the statistical tasks that are covered in the course: Analysis of Variance/Covariance, Simple and Multiple Linear Regression, Categorical data analysis including Chi-square test and Correspondence analysis, Multivariate analysis including Principal component and Factor analysis, Classification and Clustering. Use of data from experiments and surveys.

## Tech & Tools: choosing from over 1000 options

In recent years, several digital tools have been released that are specifically designed to assist the research process. These include online platforms for finding and collating the relevant literature, sites to boost your online profile and attract attention for your research outputs, project management tools and writing productivity. This vast array of (approximately 1,000) tools can be overwhelming and time consuming to learn so how do researchers know what to use?

This workshop will introduce researchers to a selection of tools that can complement the research process including aspects such as literature searching, project management, profile visibility, interaction and collaboration. Additional resources and information are also provided so that participants can explore other tools in their own time and everyone is encouraged to share and recommend resources. A key component to the workshop includes the opportunity for participants use the Electv tool matrix to design their own digital strategy based on their individual working style and preferences.

The workshop will include short demonstrations, case studies, group discussions and examples from the instructor's own experience.

## Time management, motivation & prioritising your workload

How do you finish everything when you're under pressure? Why is there never enough time to do what you want to do?

The workshop will include individual exercises, short presentations from the instructor, group discussions and examples of good practice.

- an understanding of their priorities and how to optimise their time;
- a time management strategy that can be adapted on a regular basis to suit their workload.
